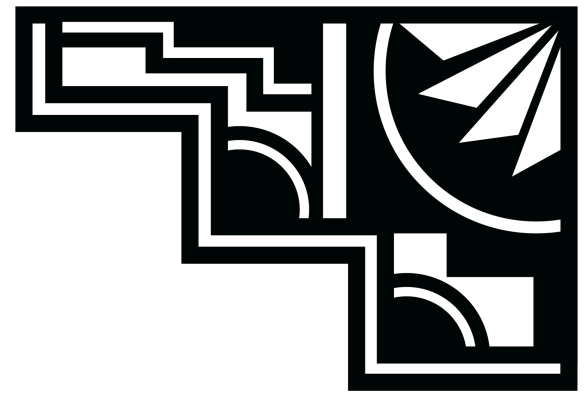
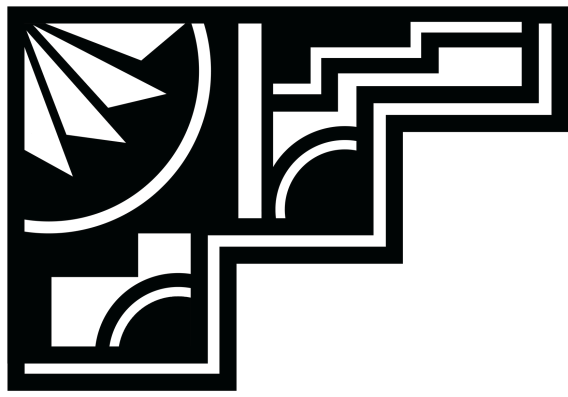

IAD collaborates with other state agencies, promotes public participation and serves as the clearinghouse for all state programs impacting tribal communities.

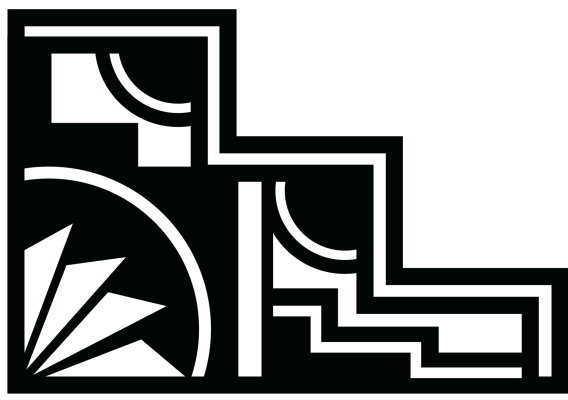
Vision

The NM Indian Affairs Department is committed to be a resource by:

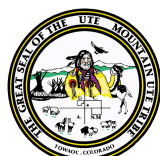
- Advocating for tribal interests at state and federal levels through policy and legislative work;
