- Resolution for NASC Fiscal Year (FY) 27 meetings, announced by IADs General Counsel Adelina Gomez. Identified dates are quarterly NASC meeting on the first Wednesday of every third month falling on the following: August 5, 2026; November 4, 2026, February 3, 2027; and May 5, 2027.

IAD Updates

- Tamara Espinoza has joined IAD as the Behavioral Health Suicide Prevention Specialist.
- Garrett W. Briggs, a citizen of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe, is the Tribal Consultation Specialist for the New Mexico Indian Affairs Department.
- Natasha Ashley Brokeshoulder, from the Navajo Nation, has joined IAD as the MMIP Program Coordinator.
- Karmela Martinez is now the Program Services Division Director at IAD.

NASC Attendance Survey

Behavioral Health Planning Council (BHPC) Overview

- BHPC provides recommendations to state leadership regarding behavioral health policies, programs, and funding.
- The council ensures consumer voice, recovery, resiliency, and lived experience remain central to decision-making.

- BHPC is federally required by SAMHSA as part of New Mexico’s Mental Health and Substance Use Block Grant funding process.
- Three subcommittees report to the council:
 - Adult Substance Use & Medicaid Subcommittee
 - Children & Adolescent Subcommittee
 - Native American Subcommittee (NASC)

Behavioral Health Services Division Block Grant Overview

Presenter: Cindy Romero, Behavioral Health Services Division (BHSD)

Substance Use Prevention, Treatment & Recovery Services (SUPTRS) Block Grant

- Largest source of non-Medicaid behavioral health funding in NM; approx. \$10M annually.
- Funds prevention, treatment, recovery, and dual-diagnosis services.

Required Allocations (SAMHSA):

- 5% admin
- 1% capacity building
- 4% street outreach
- 10% women & dependent children
- 20% prevention (currently 30%)
- 40% outpatient/inpatient treatment
- Recovery support increased from 5% to 9%; goal 10–15%
- Individuals served last year: 3,895

Mental Health Block Grant

- Federally funded through SAMHSA; approx. \$5.9M annually.
- Supports adults with SMI, children with SED, and individuals with dual diagnosis.

Required Allocations:

- 5% admin
- 5% statewide crisis services
- 10% First Episode Psychosis (via UNM)
- 80% outpatient services through ~20 providers
- Individuals served last year: 5,624

Funding Process

- No current RFAs/RFPs due to limited funding and federal requirements.
- Allocations reviewed annually.
- Future opportunities will be shared via BHPC, NASC, Provider Alerts, and Planning Council communications.

NASC Priorities

- NASC priorities are based on meeting discussions and survey data from previous NASC meetings.
- Priorities and action items will be sent to NASC for their review.

NASC Leadership Roles

Discussion included:

- NASC co-chair structure
 - One co-chair designated through the New Mexico Indian Affairs Department
 - Additional co-chair nominations forthcoming
- Recruitment of up to 25 voting members statewide.
- Clarification that participation is open even for non-voting members.

NASC Bylaws

Discussion on the development of NASC-specific bylaws:

- Based largely on existing BHPC bylaws
- Additional provisions to address:
 - Voting membership
 - Quorum requirements
 - Meeting procedures
 - Representation and consensus process

Public Comments and Question and Answers

- A recent Native American Youth Summit, held at Santa Ana Pueblo, had strong youth participation and highlighted statewide expansion of youth behavioral health and prevention efforts.
- The Local Collaborative (LC)16 continues collaborative work focused on online predation, sextortion awareness, suicide and violent crime prevention, and related behavioral health concerns.
- Upcoming events include the NMDOH Community Alcohol Prevention Summit on June 1 in Mescalero.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PLANNING COUNCIL (BHPC)

The BHPC's role is as follows:

- ▶ Make recommendations to state leaders on policies, programs, and funding;
- ▶ Provide ongoing input on major behavioral health initiatives both federally and locally funded;
- ▶ Ensure consumer voice, choice, recovery, and resiliency are truly reflected in decision-making.

Additionally, the council is required by SAMSHA, for New Mexico's Mental Health and Substance Use Block Grant Funding, and at least 51% of the council must be consumers and family member, ensuring lived experience stays at the center of everything they do.



BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES DIVISION

BLOCK GRANTS

Program purpose:

The **Substance Use Prevention Treatment Recovery Services (SUPTRS)** program is the largest source of non-Medicaid federal funding received by the BHSD. SUPTRS funds are used to plan, implement, and evaluate activities aimed at preventing and treating substance use disorders (SUDs). It is also the largest federal program dedicated to addressing these state-level issues.

Target populations:

SUPTRS funds provide services for substance use treatment, prevention, recovery support and other services related to substance use disorder and individuals who have dual diagnoses.

Yearly Budget:

SUPTRS ~ \$10 million

The SUPTRS budget is divided as follows: 5% Administrative, 1% Capacity Building, 4% Street Outreach, 10% Women & Dependent Children, 30% Prevention, 40% Outpatient and Inpatient Treatment and ~9% to Recovery Support Services.

Total people served:

SUPTRS ~ 3,895. This represents the number of clients served represented through BHSD Star Claims system.

BLOCK GRANTS CONT.

Program purpose:

The **Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (MHBG)** is a federal funded block grant designed to provide comprehensive outpatient community mental health services. The MHBG primarily serves adults with serious mental illness (SMI), children with severe emotional disturbance (SED), and individuals with dual diagnoses.

Target populations:

MHBG funds are utilized for comprehensive community mental health services for individuals who are adults with a serious mental illness (SMI) or children with a severe emotional disturbance (SED) and includes individuals who have dual diagnoses.

Yearly Budget:

MHBG ~ \$ 5.9 million

The MHBG budget is divided as follows: 5% Administrative Costs, 5% Crisis Services, 10% First Episode Psychosis, 80% Outpatient.

Total people served:

MHBG ~ 5,624. This represents the number of clients served represented through BHSD Star Claims system.

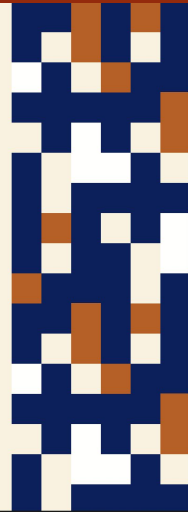

**NEW MEXICO BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PLANNING COMMITTEE,

ANNUAL OPEN MEETINGS ACT RESOLUTION FOR FY27**

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Behavioral Health Planning Counsel, Native American Subcommittee (NASC) is a public policy-making body within the State of New Mexico and therefore subject to requirements of the New Mexico Open Meetings Act (OMA), NMSA 1978, §§ 10-15-1 through 4; and

WHEREAS, any meeting subject to the OMA at which the discussion or adoption of any proposed resolution, rule, regulation or formal action occurs shall be held only after reasonable notice to the public; and

WHEREAS, the OMA, NMSA 1978, § 10-15-1(D), specifically requires every public body to annually review and decide what additional public notice is reasonable for its meetings, including the methods and timeframe for such notice; and

WHEREAS, all obligations of the OMA are followed by NASC, even if not expressly restated in this Resolution; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. Public Notices: Notices shall be provided to the public and will include the time, date, location of the meeting, and information on how to obtain a copy of the agenda. Public notices shall be provided, at a minimum, through the following methods:

A. Posted prominently on the Indian Affairs Department website:
<https://www.iad.nm.gov/native-american-subcommittee-nasc/>

B. Posted prominently at the Indian Affairs Department at:

1220 S. St. Francis Drive
Suite 251
Santa Fe, NM 87505

C. Emailed or otherwise distributed to any broadcast station, licensed federal communications commission, newspaper, or other individual or entity that has made a written request to receive notice of NASC meetings.

2. Meeting Agendas: NASC meeting agendas shall be available before every meeting and will include a list of specific items of business to be discussed or voted on. Agenda items shall be written with sufficient description so that the average person can reasonably understand the subject to be discussed and can anticipate when a vote or formal action may occur. Agendas shall be finalized and posted as soon as is practical, but no less than seventy-two (72) hours prior to each meeting and made available on the Indian Affairs Department website: <https://www.iad.nm.gov/native-american-subcommittee-nasc/>.

3. Regular Meetings: Regular meetings shall be held once each quarter on: August 5, 2026; November 4, 2026; February 3, 2027; and May 5, 2027. Meetings will begin at 10:00 AM MST. Regular meetings may also be held at the call of the Chair, as indicated on the meeting notice. Public notice shall be provided per Section 1 of this policy as soon as is practical, but no less than ten (10) calendar days prior to the regular meeting. Regular meetings may be rescheduled by meeting the notice requirements established in Section 1 of this policy.

4. Special Meetings: Special meetings are those held outside of regular meetings due to unforeseen circumstances or other needs warranting an additional meeting. Special meetings should be limited to agenda items that cannot reasonably wait until the next regular meeting. Public notice shall be made pursuant to Section 1 of this policy and provided as soon as practical, but no less than seventy-two (72) hours prior to a special meeting.

5. Emergency Matters: NASC may, under extraordinary circumstances, consider and act on limited emergency matters in a noticed meeting, separate meeting, or through any other collaborative process appropriate under the circumstances pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 10-15-1(F). Reasonable efforts shall be made to provide public notice before, when possible, and after any emergency matter is considered, including an explanation at the next meeting of any action taken and the circumstances creating the emergency. Emergency meeting notice requirements are met if prominently posted on the Indian Affairs Department website: <https://www.iad.nm.gov/native-american-subcommittee-nasc/> and emailed to any broadcast station, newspaper, or other individual or entity that has made a written request to receive notice of our meetings.

6. Meeting Location: Meetings will be held virtually, via Zoom. All meetings can be accessed through the following:



Situations or events in which a number of our members sufficient to constitute a quorum are present, but which are not convened for the purpose of discussing public policy, such as a social event, do not implicate OMA. However, we will disclose the occurrence of any such situations or events, when practical, during a public meeting to mitigate concerns of noncompliance.

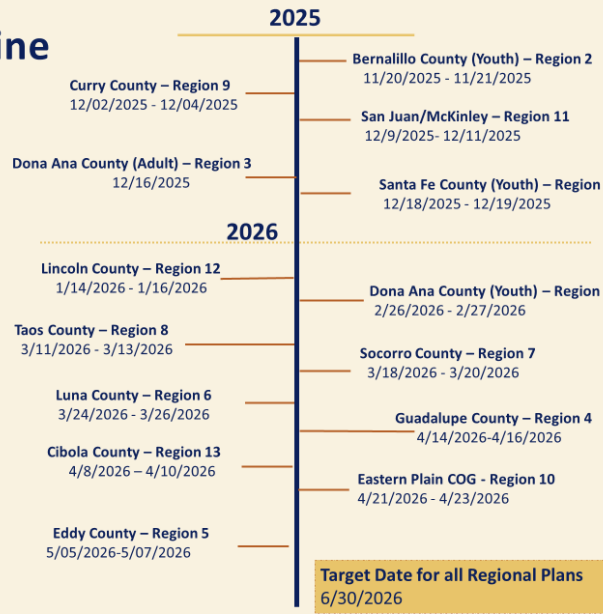
