



NEW MEXICO INDIAN AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT FY 2019 ANNUAL REPORT

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I. Executive Summary

The New Mexico Indian Affairs Department (“IAD” or “department”) facilitates communication and collaboration between the Governor’s Office, state agencies, and the twenty-three (23) Indian tribes, nations, and pueblos on programs and issues affecting Native Americans in New Mexico.

During fiscal year 2019, New Mexico experienced a change in gubernatorial leadership which impacted the Indian Affairs Department. Newly elected Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham appointed Lynn Trujillo as Cabinet Secretary to replace former Acting Cabinet Secretary Suzette Shije. With the change came a renewed commitment from the IAD to reestablish relationships and rebuild state-tribal relations. Secretary Lynn Trujillo and Deputy Secretary Nadine Padilla are committed to leading the department in a manner that is transparent and fosters collaboration and communication between the state and tribes.

The department continued administration of tribal infrastructure funds, capital outlay funds, and tobacco settlement funds during FY2019. In June 2018, the Tribal Infrastructure Fund Board approved funding for nine tribal infrastructure projects totaling \$8,831,925. The department also appropriated \$250,000 of general funds to support special projects in tribal communities. In addition, the NM State Legislature appropriated \$249,300 from the Tobacco Settlement Fund to the IAD to promote commercial tobacco cessation and prevention outreach in tribal communities across the state. The Legislature in 2018 appropriated IAD a total of \$3,811,506 for 42 capital outlay infrastructure projects.

During the 2019 Legislative session there was a historic amount of funding for tribal capital outlay projects. This reflects the leadership of numerous state legislators and Governor Michell Lujan Grisham. IAD will continue to work diligently to administer these funds and will provide technical assistance to tribes.

Other successes of the 2019 legislative session included the passage of several key bills, some of which are listed below:

- House Bill 100 – Replace Columbus Day as Indigenous Peoples' Day
- House Bill 250 – Native American Student Needs Assessments
- Senate Bill 407 – Lottery Funds for Tribal Colleges
- Senate Bill 489 – Energy Transition Act
- House Bill 581 – Hemp Manufacturing Act
- House Bill 278 – Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Taskforce

IAD hosted the State Tribal Leaders Summit in May 2019 which was attended by Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham, tribal leaders, cabinet secretaries, and tribal liaisons. The Summit provided a space for reflection and goal setting as the new administration looked at opportunities for collaboration and critically assessed state processes for improvement. The “State Tribal Leaders Summit – Final Report” provides a list of recommendations that will shape IAD’s work moving forward.

II. Agency Overview & Background

The Indian Affairs Department takes the lead in coordinating intergovernmental and interagency programs concerning tribal governments and the State of New Mexico. IAD was elevated to a cabinet level department in 2004 and was given broad statutory authority in the Indian Affairs Department Act (NMSA §9-21-0 to 9-21-16) to:

1. Investigate, study, consider and act upon the entire subject of Indian conditions and relations within New Mexico, including problems of health, economy and education and the effect of local, state and federal legislative, executive and judicial actions; and
2. Assist in setting the policy, and act as the clearinghouse, for all state programs affecting the Indian people of New Mexico.

Within the statutory requirements, the department revised its vision and mission statement to reflect the renewed commitment of IAD to serve the tribes, pueblos, and nations in the state.

Vision

Tribal nations and tribal communities are happy, healthy, and prosperous, where traditional ways of life are honored, valued, and respected.

Mission

IAD commits to serving as a resource for tribal communities by:

- Advocating for tribal interests through policy and legislative advocacy;
- Supporting tribes with access to resources, technical assistance, and funding opportunities; and
- Building relationships between tribes and the executive branch, state departments, and the legislature.

Organization Chart

The IAD's change in leadership in January 2019 resulted in a restructuring of the department, with a goal of increasing accountability and coordination. The department's current organization chart is attached as Appendix A.

Cabinet Secretary Lynn Trujillo is the agency head, replacing former Acting Cabinet Secretary Suzette Shiye. Cabinet Secretary Trujillo supervises the Deputy Cabinet Secretary, Nadine Padilla, the Executive Assistant, Kelly Barela, and the Chief Financial Officer, Drew Roybal-Chavez.

Deputy Secretary Padilla and Cabinet Secretary Trujillo supervise the Policy Legislative Analysis & Communications Bureau Chief, Keegan King, General Counsel, Carrie Frias, and Senior Policy Analyst, Stephanie Salazar.

The Policy and Legislative Analysis & Communications Bureau Chief, Keegan King supervises two Policy Analysts and the Public Relations Coordinator. The Policy Analysts monitor legislation and policy initiatives on a federal and local level. During the legislative session, policy analysts are responsible for drafting bill analyses and researching the impact of proposed legislation on tribes in the state. The department is working to fill both positions. The Public Relations Coordinator, Sherrie Catanach, ensures that the public is informed of department activities and initiatives by issuing press releases and social media. She assists the Bureau Chief to coordinate speaking engagements for Secretary Trujillo and Deputy Secretary Padilla. Finally, the Public Relations Coordinator compiles and distributes daily news updates to department leadership and staff.

Carrie Frias is the General Counsel for IAD. The General Counsel is responsible for collaborating with state and tribal entities on Indian Law legal issues. The General Counsel renders legal opinions for the cabinet secretary, deputy cabinet secretary, IAD managers, and staff. The General Counsel also attends and provides legal advice at department meetings. The General Counsel provides legal analysis and information to other cabinet-level state agencies on tribal sovereignty and other Indian Law issues.

The Senior Policy Analyst position was created to assist Secretary Trujillo and Deputy Secretary Padilla on department initiatives that require coordination and collaboration with the state, tribes, nations, and pueblos. Stephanie Salazar is the Senior Policy Analyst for IAD. The Senior Policy Analyst is responsible for drafting reports, researching, and representing the department in meetings.

The Chief Financial Officer/Human Resources Coordinator, Drew Roybal-Chavez, supervises the Chief Procurement Officer/Capital Outlay Administrator, Chandler Kahawai, Tribal Infrastructure Administrator, Lawrence John, Procurement & Contracts Specialist, Kelly Barela, and the General Ledger Accountant. The CFO/HR Coordinator is responsible for ensuring fiscal and administrative control of all funds managed by the Administrative Services Division of the IAD. The position is also responsible for the agency's Human Resources coordination.

The Chief Procurement Officer & Capital Outlay Administrator, Chandler Kahawai, ensures that all procurement and contractual agreements for the agency are accurate and follow the State Procurement Code and policies and procedures outlined by the NM Department of Finance & Administration and the State Purchasing Division. This position is also responsible for timely and accurate reporting and project management of all IAD capital outlay appropriations. This position includes providing technical assistance and training to all IAD capital outlay grantees and conducting site visits to ensure project compliance.

The Tribal Infrastructure Fund Administrator, Lawrence John, is responsible for timely and accurate reporting and project management of all IAD tribal infrastructure fund appropriations to include providing technical assistance and training of all IAD capital outlay grantees. This position

also coordinates all Tribal Infrastructure Fund Board meetings and conducts site visits to ensure project compliance.

The Procurement & Contracts Specialist, Kelly Barela, processes all contractual services agreements for the agency and initiates all procurement for goods and services excluding infrastructure. This position manages IAD's grant programs and processes "accounts payable" transactions for the general fund.

The General Ledger Accountant manages all general ledger activity for the agency, oversees fiscal administration of IAD infrastructure appropriations, completes monthly fund reconciliations, and coordinates annual financial audit and financial statement drafting.

III. Agency Efforts to Implement Policy

Policy Initiatives

Suicide Prevention – Suicide continues to impact tribal communities in the state at alarming rates. IAD will provide tribes with the tools required to effectively respond and intervene when a tribal member attempts suicide or has suicidal ideations. This may be achieved through the creation of crisis response and postvention response plans. IAD will support local organizations to continue this critical work in tribal communities.

Census 2020 – The 2020 Census is critical to the representation of Native American communities and it determines the amount of federal dollars that will be allocated to the state and tribes. IAD is collaborating with the state, tribes, and grassroots organizers to establish a Complete Count Committee that will raise awareness about the importance of the census, increase self-response rates, and provide tribal leadership with technical assistance in preparation for the 2020 Census. The IAD received \$400,000 from the Department of Finance & Administration in preparation for the 2020 Census to ensure a fair and accurate complete count for New Mexico, especially the hard-to-count communities in our state.

Broadband – Broadband infrastructure in tribal communities is desperately lacking, yet broadband infrastructure is critical to give rural communities in the state an opportunity to develop their economy, access telehealth services, and educational and public safety resources. IAD is working with partners to understand the scope of the problem and to identify potential solutions.

Behavioral Health – IAD participates in the Behavioral Health Collaborative and the Native American Subcommittee. IAD has also attended meetings held by the Recovery Communities of New Mexico and the Native American Suicide Prevention Advisory Committee. Moving forward, the department will continue highlighting the behavioral health needs identified during the 2019 State Tribal Leaders Summit.

Tribal Liaisons

Tribal liaisons are critical to ensure communication and collaboration between state agencies and tribal nations. IAD maintains a listing of current tribal liaisons for every state agency. The department has met with tribal liaisons to discuss challenges and opportunities. IAD is critically looking at the role of tribal liaisons to see where the IAD can offer more support to ensure better communication and collaboration.

Communication and Outreach

Communication is critical to ensure that IAD fulfills its statutory duty to be the “coordinating agency for intergovernmental and interagency programs concerning tribal governments and the state.” IAD strives to provide helpful and timely feedback when assistance is requested by state agencies or tribes.

The department disperses “IAD Insight,” a monthly web-based newsletter that highlights state agency updates. As of May 31, 2019, the department will begin issuing the newsletter quarterly rather than monthly. Social media and email are used to share department activities and announcements to stakeholders, constituents, grantees, and the general public. The communications team is working on a website redesign to bring an updated and user-friendly experience to our stakeholders, constituents, and the general public. IAD maintains an active presence on three primary social media platforms: Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram. Followership and engagement on social channels are steadily growing, with increased interactions with our content happening entirely within social platforms.

IV. Current and Planned Programs and Services for Native Communities

Goal 1: Advocate for tribal interests at state and federal levels through policy and legislative work.

American Indian Day

American Indian Day is an annual event that occurs during the legislative session on the first day of February at the state Capitol. This year, IAD was pleased to welcome Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham, who acknowledged the 10th anniversary of the State Tribal Collaboration Act and highlighted her administration’s commitment to rebuild the relations between cabinet-level agencies and tribes. Representative Deb Haaland also spoke at the Capitol Rotunda and during the evening reception. The theme of this year’s American Indian Day was “Celebrating 10 Years of the State Tribal Collaboration Act.”

2019 Legislative Session

With over 1,600 bills introduced in the 2019 legislation, the IAD policy unit analyzed 85 bills for the Legislative Finance Committee and tracked more than 100 bills that would impact Indian communities and the department.

The following bills were passed during the 2019 legislative session and are a current **high priority** for the department:

- House Bill 278 – *Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) Taskforce*: Requires the IAD to convene a taskforce that studies the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women in the state and to produce a report that has findings and recommendations to the state legislature. IAD will strive to understand the full extent of MMIW in the state and to develop recommendations that systematically document the issue, while ensuring that the Native community has meaningful input.
- Senate Bill 489 – *Energy Transition Act*: Directs the IAD to administer the Energy Transition Indian Affairs Fund to assist Native communities and people in the affected area following the closure of the San Juan Generating Station and Four Corners Power Plant. IAD strives for transparency that allows local communities to be involved in the ETA implementation and to make use of available resources that can improve the quality of life for all working families in the Four Corners region.

The department and other state agencies are referenced in the following bills. IAD is building capacity in the following areas to engage and advocate on behalf of tribes to ensure effective implementation.

- House Memorial 70 – *Protect Native Songs and Dances*: Requests the Office of the Attorney General, Cultural Affairs, and IAD to work with Indian nations, tribes, and pueblos to enhance protection of Pueblo, Navajo, Apache, and intertribal dances and songs as protected state cultural resources.
- Senate Bill 228 – *Wildlife Corridors Act*: Directs the Departments of Game and Fish and Transportation to prepare a Wildlife Corridors Action Plan. Provides opportunities for Indian nations, tribes, and pueblos to enter into joint powers agreements for wildlife migration corridors that cross state or tribal land.

The department is not mentioned in the following bill language, however IAD is consulting with other agencies on implementation. IAD is working closely with the Public Education Department, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department, and the Higher Education Department to implement the following education legislation, which was passed in response to the *Yazzie/Martinez* lawsuit. The *Yazzie and Martinez v. State of New Mexico* held that New Mexico is not meeting its constitutional obligation to provide *all* students with a uniform statewide system of free public schools sufficient for their education. This lawsuit focused on the state's responsibility to low income, Native American, and English-language learner students.

- House Bill 5 – *Public Education Changes*: Reforms the Public School Code to enhance select school programs, increase teacher salaries, and amends the public school funding formula to increase investments in schools with at risk students, extended time learning programs, and schools located in rural areas.
- House Bill 589 – *Community School, Early Childhood & Pre-K*: Amends the Community School Act to expand the purpose of community schools and to determine the cultural and linguistic needs of students from early childhood programs and pre-kindergarten through high school.
- House Bill 250 – *Native American Student Needs Assessments*: Requires school districts with high numbers of Indian students to prepare needs assessments to assess the services school districts need to provide to Indian students to help them graduate and be ready for college and a career.
- Senate Bill 22 – *Early Childhood Education and Care Department*: Creates the Early Childhood Education and Care Department as a cabinet-level department. The Department will create an Assistant Secretary for Native American Early Education and Care. The Assistant Secretary will be responsible for oversight of Indian early childhood education programs, consultation with tribal governments, and collaboration with providers and community partners to provide culturally relevant education for Indian children.

Goal 2: Support infrastructure projects in tribal communities and ensure success through effective communication and technical assistance.

Special Projects & Tobacco Cessation & Prevention Grant Funding

The Administrative Services Division (ASD) of the department administered two grant programs during the 2019 fiscal year: The Special Projects Grants Program (SP) and the Tobacco Cessation & Prevention Projects Grant Program (TCPP).

The IAD was appropriated \$250,000 of general funding to support special projects in tribal communities. Special Projects vary in scope from youth projects, language preservation, veterans outreach services, aging and elder services, education cultural enrichment, and drug and alcohol awareness. The tables below highlight each grant program funded by IAD during the FY19 fiscal year.

IAD would like to highlight the successes of the Pueblo of Santa Clara's Water & Wastewater System Improvement Project. This project will ensure utility improvements to the community water and wastewater systems which will improve operations, public safety, and the general quality of life for the community. The Pueblo has committed and expended funds towards the \$770,000 appropriation and anticipates completing the project before the close of the 2020 fiscal year.

Mescalero Apache Tribe- Activity Bus Purchase:

IAD would like to highlight the successes of the Mescalero Apache Tribe's Activity Bus Purchase Project. This project ensured the purchase of a large activity bus for the Mescalero Apache Tribe's students. This purchase will accommodate school trips and can be used during community events. The Tribe has fully expended funds towards this purchase in the amount of \$175,000 and closed the project out on July 29, 2019.

During the 2019 legislative session, the IAD was appropriated a total of \$75,070,124 for 143 capital outlay infrastructure projects highlighted in the table below.

Goal 3: Connect tribes with the executive branch, other tribes, and with tools and resources they need to be self-governing and self-sufficient.

State-Tribal Leaders Summit

The 2019 State-Tribal Leaders Summit (STLS or Summit) was held on May 15-16, 2019 at the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center in Albuquerque, New Mexico. In preparation for the STLS, the IAD contacted tribal leaders to discuss what topics they wanted to see included on the agenda. After the initial phone calls, IAD sent a survey to all the tribes, pueblos, and nations in the state requesting specific feedback on the topics that were identified. IAD also held a meeting with the

state tribal liaisons to get input from the state about what issues needed to be addressed on a government-to-government level. Based on all the feedback, the topics addressed during the Summit included: Education, Healthy Communities, Water and Cultural Sites Protection, and Public Safety.

The Summit began with a pre-summit convening where state and tribal leaders heard presentations on the State-Tribal Collaboration Act (STCA). The presentations covered the history of the STCA and included reflections about the effectiveness of the act today.

Day one of the Summit provided tribal leaders with an opportunity to address IAD's Secretary to communicate candidly about concerns or issues they were having with the state. Two presentations were made on day one that provided an overview of the history of state-tribal relations and background into the creation and development of the State-Tribal Collaboration Act.

Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham attended day two of the Summit and engaged with tribal leaders on the various topics covered. Specific commitments were made on day two and are listed in the 2019 "State Tribal Leaders Summit Final Report." The full report can be accessed on the Indian Affairs Department's website.

Below are some of the commitments that were made during the Summit:

Education:

- The state will invite tribes to participate in future discussions surrounding policies, regulations, and funding mechanisms when creating the Early Childhood Education and Care Department.
- Tribal leaders will identify the number of children in their respective communities that should have access to early childhood education.
- The Public Education Department and tribal leaders will provide input and participate in the assessment of school districts and curriculum.

Healthy Communities:

- The Department of Health will create funding models that are less fragmented and less complicated in order to support programs in tribal communities.
- The Department of Health and Health and Human Services Department will draft a SNAP amendment to include a tribal needs assessment.
- The Children Youth and Families Department and tribal leaders will develop a pilot program aimed at establishing community-based mental health services on tribal lands.

Water and Cultural Sites Protection:

- Tribal leaders and the State Parks Division will collaborate with Tribal Historic Preservation Offices to develop a management system for Pecos State Park.
- Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Division and the Environment Department will begin tribal consultation on new methane rules.

- The Office of the State Engineer will develop a 50-year water plan that is inclusive of tribal needs.

Public Safety:

- The Children Youth and Families Department, Department of Public Safety, and tribal leaders will collectively work on reducing suicide rates among tribal youth, address the lack of existing resources for the state and tribal justice systems, leverage resources, and create better partnerships.
- The Children Youth and Families Department and tribal leaders will establish inter-governmental agreements on juvenile justice.

The IAD is committed to assisting to ensure follow-through on the commitments that were made during the Summit.

V. Training & Employee Notification

Cultural Competency Training for State Employees

IAD continued supporting the State Personnel Office by facilitating the cultural competency training for state employees. IAD is in the process of reviewing the training curriculum to ensure that state employees are receiving training that provides skills and tools that are needed to effectively communicate, serve, and collaborate with tribes in the state.

Additional trainings attended by IAD Staff:

- Online Defensive Driving Course & Administrative Use of State Vehicles– Four IAD employees completed the defense driving course.
- Communicating Clearly with Professionalism, Respect, and Tact Seminar – attended by six IAD employees.
- Attorney General Open Meetings Act & Inspection of Public Records Training – attended by five IAD employees.
