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Letter from Secretary

The enclosed report highlights IAD's continued role as the State's primary liaison and advocate for Tribal Governments, ensuring that Tribal voices inform state decision-making, investments, and policies that affect Native communities across New Mexico. During FY25, IAD advanced statewide priorities through targeted funding, policy leadership, and sustained engagement, with a focus on behavioral health and suicide prevention, youth leadership development, public safety initiatives, environmental justice, and culturally grounded health and wellness strategies. The report also reflects the Department's ongoing efforts to strengthen the institutional foundations of state-tribal collaboration through consultation, training, technical assistance, and accountability.

Looking ahead to FY26, IAD remains committed to strengthening relationships with Tribal Governments, enhancing internal systems and fiscal oversight, expanding community visibility, and supporting initiatives that advance Tribal self-determination, prosperity, and well-being. Through continued collaboration and strategic investment, the Department will uphold the principles of the STCA and honor the sovereignty, priorities, and resilience of New Mexico's Native communities.

We appreciate your continued partnership and support in advancing meaningful state-tribal collaboration.

Executive Summary

The New Mexico Indian Affairs Department (IAD) serves as the State's primary connector and advocate for the Nations, Pueblos, and Tribes (NPTs) in New Mexico. IAD serves as a liaison between Tribal Governments, the Governor's Office and cabinet-level agencies. While IAD does not provide direct services, the Department plays a critical role to ensure Tribal voices inform state decision-making, policies, and investments that directly affect Native American communities across New Mexico.

During Fiscal Year 2025, IAD advanced statewide priorities through targeted investments, policy leadership, and sustained engagement aligned with the STCA framework. The Department supported NPTs through behavioral health and suicide prevention initiatives, youth leadership development, public safety programs, environmental justice efforts, and culturally grounded health and wellness strategies. IAD administered and monitored millions of dollars in grant funding, special appropriations, Capital Outlay, and Tribal Infrastructure Fund (TIF) projects to expand access to infrastructure, services, and economic opportunity while ensuring accountability and alignment with legislative intent.

IAD also strengthened the institutional foundations of state-tribal collaboration. The Department convened the annual State-Tribal Leaders Summit, coordinated regular meetings with agency-designated Tribal liaisons, and partnered with the State Personnel Office to update and expand required cultural competency and STCA training. In FY25, over 1,000 state employees completed the training, a significant increase from the prior year and reinforcing statewide compliance with STCA requirements. Through reporting, technical assistance, and liaison support, IAD helped state agencies better integrate communication and collaboration into daily operations.

Looking ahead to Fiscal Year 2026, IAD remains committed to strengthening its role as a trusted resource, convener, and relationship-builder. The Department will continue prioritizing health, youth engagement, economic development, infrastructure delivery, and culturally responsive services for NPTs and tribal citizens, while improving internal systems, standard operating procedures, and fiscal oversight. Through sustained engagement, strategic funding and continued leadership, IAD will advance Tribal self-determination and ensure that state actions honor the sovereignty, priorities and resilience of New Mexico's Native communities.

History & Background

New Mexico has over 263,315 Native Americans, comprising around 12% of the state's entire population. 2020 U.S. Census Bureau, Population Division.

In 2003, under Governor Bill Richardson's administration, the Office of Indian Affairs was elevated to cabinet-level by Executive Order. Then, in 2004, IAD was created by statute (Indian Affairs Department Act (NMSA 1978, §§ 9-21-1 *et seq.*)).

In 2005, the Tribal Infrastructure Act created the Tribal Infrastructure Fund (TIF)(NMSA 1978, §§ 6-29-1 *et seq.* (recompiled from §§ 9-21-17 *et seq.* in 2008)). The State Legislature authorizes

the State Board of Finance to issue Severance Tax Bonds (STB) for use by the Tribal Infrastructure Board to fund tribal infrastructure projects. The State Board of Finance allocates 4.5% of estimated bonding capacity for tribal infrastructure projects (NMSA 1978, § 7-27-10.1(D)).

In 2006, New Mexico enacted the Indian Capital Outlay Act (NMSA 1978, §§ 6-28-1 *et seq.*). The Indian Capital Outlay Act enables the state to provide financial assistance to residents within Indian Country in New Mexico (NMSA 1978, § 6-28-1).

In 2009, New Mexico enacted the State-Tribal Collaboration Act (STCA)(NMSA 1978, §§ 11-18-1 *et seq.*). The STCA establishes how the State should engage with tribal governments in respect of state-tribal relations.

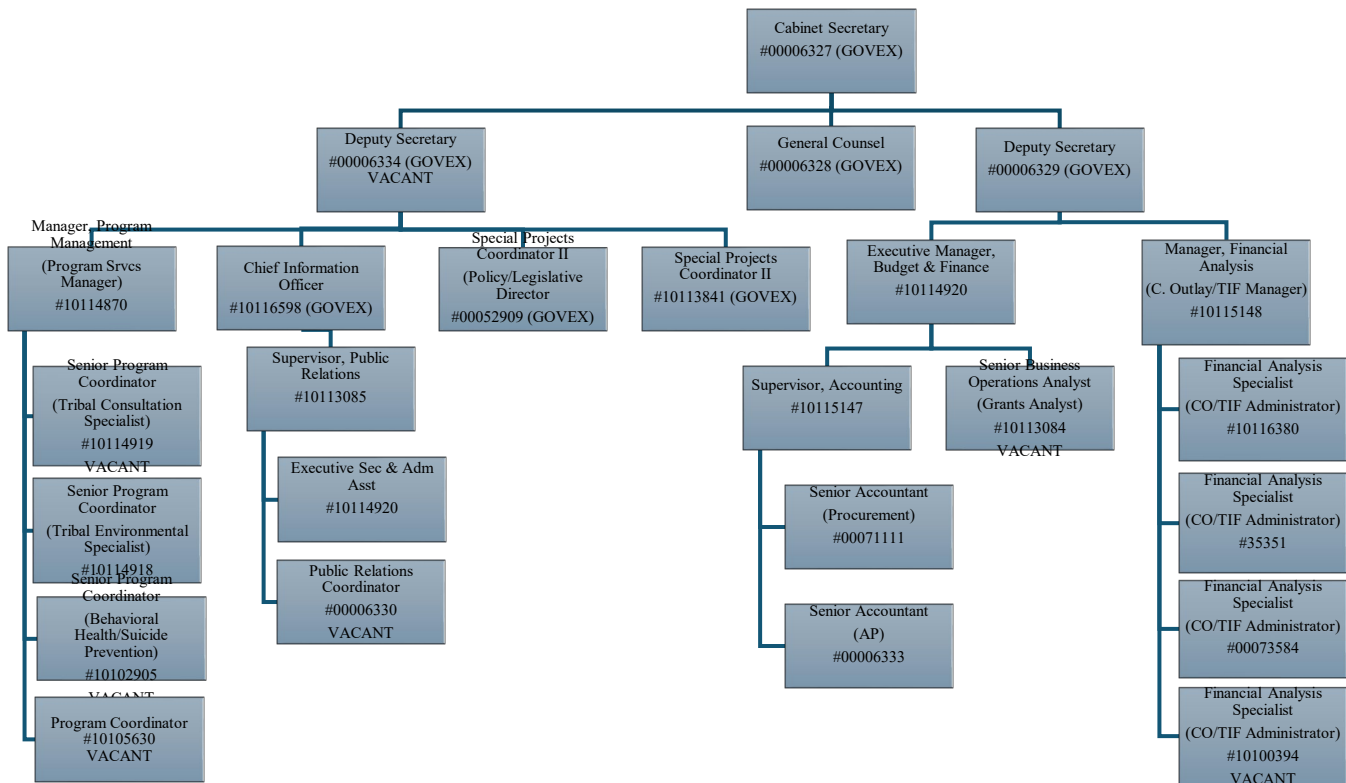
State-Tribal Collaboration Act (STCA)

The STCA provides the framework for the state and tribes to work together to develop successful programs and services to benefit New Mexico's Native American citizens and has five main provisions:

1. **Annual Summit** - The Governor will meet with leaders of tribal nations, tribes, and pueblos in a "state-tribal summit" to discuss issues of mutual concern, at least once per year.
2. **Communication and Collaboration Policies** – All cabinet-level state agencies are required to develop and implement a formal policy that governs how they communicate and collaborate with Indian nations, tribes, and pueblos. These policies must encourage effective communication, support respectful government-to-government relationships, promote culturally competent services for American Indian and Alaska Native communities, and ensure employees are informed of both the Act and the agency's policy.
3. **Tribal Liaisons** – Each state agency must designate a tribal liaison who reports directly to the agency head. The liaison's role includes supporting the development and implementation of the agency's collaboration policy, maintaining ongoing communication with tribes, and ensuring required training is provided to agency staff. The Indian Affairs Department maintains a public directory of tribal leadership and state agency tribal liaisons.
4. **Annual Reports** – Every agency must submit an annual report (by July 31 each year) to the IAD, detailing their adopted policy, contact information for relevant staff, current and planned efforts to implement collaboration, training completion statistics, descriptions of services/programs directed at American Indian/Alaska Native populations (with funding levels), and how the agency notified employees about STCA. The reports are compiled by IAD and later submitted to the Governor and the Legislature for transparency and oversight.
5. **Training for State Employees** - State agency employees and managers who regularly communicate with tribes must take training, provided by the State Personnel Office (in partnership with IAD). The objectives of this training are to foster effective collaboration, government-to-government relations, and cultural competency.

Vision:

Our vision is that tribal nations, tribal communities and Indigenous people are happy, healthy and prosperous and that traditional ways of life are honored, valued and respected

Mission:

The NM Indian Affairs Department is committed to be a resource by:

- Advocating for tribal interests at state and federal levels through policy and legislative work;
- Supporting tribes with access to resources, technical assistance and funding opportunities;
- Connecting tribes with the executive branch, other tribes and with the tools and resources they need to be self-governing and self-sufficient.

Per its enabling statute, IAD shall:

- Investigate, study, consider and act upon the entire subject of Indian conditions and relations within New Mexico, including problems of health, economy and education and the effect of local, state and federal legislative, executive and judicial actions;

- Collaborate with other state departments and agencies that have an interest or stake in the subject being investigated, studied or considered;
- Provide an opportunity for the presentation and exchange of ideas in respect to Indian affairs of the state by all interested persons;
- Assist in setting the policy, and act as the clearinghouse, for all state programs affecting the Indian people of New Mexico (NMSA 1978, § 9-21-7(B)).

IAD has two divisions, the Administrative Services Division (ASD) and the Program Services Division (PSD) (NMSA 1978, §§ 9-21-11 and -12). ASD provides administrative services to the IAD including overseeing the agency's general operating budget, tribal infrastructure funds, capital outlay funds and other special appropriations. ASD focuses on Capital Outlay/TIF (CO/TIF) administration, agency budget and finance. PSD provides program implementation and support for field programs and services by administering several grant opportunities to NPTs and Tribal Serving Entities (TSE), focusing on community-based outreach and promoting awareness of Tribal-State collaboration. PSD focuses on State Collaboration, Healthy Communities, Indigenous Youth, Public Environment, Safety and Public Relations.

To ensure that state government meaningfully reflects the voices and needs of the Native citizens we serve, IAD leadership and staff actively participate in and are appointed to a range of boards, commissions, committees and other decision-making forums. Through these roles, IAD provides critical insight and guidance on policies and issues impacting Native communities across New Mexico. For a full listing of the meetings and bodies that IAD leads or contributes to, please refer to Appendix E.

FY25 Top Accomplishments

Outreach & Engagement

- **IAD in the Community**

IAD engages with NPTs by upholding respect for tribal sovereignty, sharing resources, strengthening relationships, and fostering sustainable solutions to shared challenges. Throughout the year, IAD staff actively participate in community events and collaborate with key stakeholders. Staff engage with NPT personnel and constituents daily, and on average, Cabinet Secretary Monette meets with or visits Tribal Leaders approximately four times per month.

- **Tribal Learning Tours**

Secretary Monette strengthened direct engagement with NPTs through a host of visits to NPTs that she titled "Learning Tours." The Learning Tours assisted in providing the Secretary and IAD staff with better understandings of the individual tribal communities in New Mexico. In

FY25, Secretary Monette and various State Leadership from sister agencies, visited 11 NPTs for Learning Tours in FY25.

• **Communications**

IAD has two full-time positions in the office of communications. The office of communications is responsible for managing IAD's internal and external communications, including creating content, developing and implementing communication strategies and managing media relations.

IAD also provides constituent services for New Mexico citizens, linking the individual to information and state resources. This direct assistance and support helps constituents navigate government programs, resolve issues with state or federal agencies, and provides accurate, timely information about policies, legislation and available resources. These services serve as a feedback loop, helping inform the agency about on-the-ground impacts of policies and community needs.

During FY25, this team worked to promote IAD's mission, vision and goals by beginning a roll out for the team to create and implement fresh branding and establishing IAD's public facing image and voice through identifiable graphic designs and elements. Social media protocol has been improved by creating a structure for photos, captions and graphics. This new protocol and quality control has improved our social media engagement.

American Indian Day at the Capitol is an annual event, generally held on the first Friday in February, which celebrates the history, culture, and contributions of Native American people, highlighting their significant role in United States and New Mexican society and raising awareness about their diverse tribes and traditions. On February 7, 2025, IAD hosted American Indian Day at the Capitol with the theme "Tribal Self-Determination," honoring the sovereign right of NPTs to govern themselves, manage their lands, and preserve their culture. The day consisted of exhibitors and presentations by legislators and tribal leadership.

In February 2025, IAD hosted a virtual meeting with state agency tribal liaisons, which afforded an opportunity for IAD to review expectations, provide best practices and survey liaisons on agency needs. This was followed by an in-person meeting in April 2025, focused on sharing resources and fostering opportunities for cross-pollination. IAD has committed to

quarterly meetings with liaisons to provide guidance and an opportunity for state agencies to work on tribal issues and initiatives collaboratively.

On June 10, 2025, IAD hosted the annual State Tribal Leaders Summit at the Santa Fe Indian School. Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham met with Tribal Leaders while supported by agency cabinet secretaries and state tribal liaisons to discuss state priorities and solve challenges facing tribal communities. The Summit focused on strengthening relationships between sovereign tribal governments and the state, with a focus on recent funding and policy changes at the federal level.

Social Media Analytics

Social media analytics help the team better understand what the target audience responds well to, and in turn, how IAD can improve posts in order to get out important information and resources to them while planning and mapping out future posts.

Facebook

IAD's Facebook page reached over 279,000 people with an increase of 15.3%. Interactions increased 95.3%.

IAD has gained 1.1 thousand new followers on Facebook, a 29.5% increase.

IAD's top performing post was the announcement of the passing of the Tribal Regalia bill, with 250k views, nearly 16.5k interactions and over 2 thousand shares.

IAD's second top performing post was the announcement of the passing of the Turquoise Alert bill with 79k views, 1.8k interactions and nearly 400 shares.

Instagram

IAD's Instagram page reached over 80,000 people with an increase of 337%. Interactions increased by 100%.

IAD's top performing post was the announcement of the passing of the Tribal Regalia bill with 23.5k views, over 1k interactions and 250 shares.

IAD's second top performing post was for Native American Heritage month with 17.5k views, 755 interactions and 175 shares.

Health & Wellness

- **Behavioral Health**

IAD Behavioral Health & Suicide Prevention Specialist attended over 74 meetings and community engagement events in the fiscal year acting to build and maintain relationships between IAD, NPTs and TSE, while promoting awareness and engagement. Several of these meetings included obtaining information on the rollout of and how NPTs will be impacted by the 2024 Legislative Session Senate Bill (SB) 1 Behavioral Health Investment Act, SB 3 Behavioral Health reform, and House Bill (HB) 2 Behavioral Health Investment

Act. IAD continues to participate in this process by attending the Behavioral Health Reform and Investment Act (BHRIA) Executive Committee meetings.

During the 2023 Legislative Session (for FY24), IAD received a special \$25,000,000 appropriation for a Federal Match Grant and Tribal Health Care. The funding was reauthorized for FY25 and again for FY 26. About \$3,750,000 was specifically for Tribal Health Care. In FY25 IAD awarded around \$1,153,902.00 in alignment with the tribal healthcare intent.

- **Suicide Prevention**

IAD allocated \$150,000 to promote and expand behavioral health and suicide prevention services by integrating traditional practices, cultural awareness and community-driven approaches into mental health wellness and suicide prevention initiatives through utilizing cultural activities and language as the identified sources of support.

IAD partnered with UNM Honoring Native Life and Keres Consulting to provide suicide prevention that provides culturally appropriate suicide prevention assistance to the Native American citizens of New Mexico.

- **Tobacco Cessation & Prevention Program**

Native American populations experience disproportionately high rates of commercial tobacco use compared to other racial and ethnic groups. While traditional tobacco holds deep cultural and spiritual significance—used in ceremonies and for healing across Tribes—commercial tobacco is manufactured for recreational use and often contains harmful chemicals in addition to nicotine, which is highly addictive. The misuse of commercial tobacco can lead to serious health conditions such as respiratory and heart

diseases. Given the sacred role of traditional tobacco, cessation efforts for AI/AN communities must be culturally grounded, community-driven, and respectful of ceremonial practices, while emphasizing prevention, education, and accessibility.

During the 2024 Legislative Session, IAD received a \$249,300 appropriation for Tobacco Cessation and Prevention Programs (L. 2024, Ch. 69, § 4(F)). This is funded out of the Tobacco Settlement Fund and is used to fund direct tobacco cessation and prevention campaigns in Native American communities. IAD awarded funds to one NPT and engaged in a statewide campaign including statewide billboards and postcards distributed to all NPTs for circulation to community members. IAD anticipates fully awarding the remaining balances in FY26.

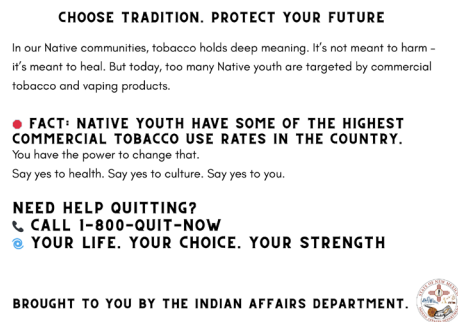


Figure 2 Back of Handout

Tribal Environmental Justice (TEJ)

The Tribal Environmental Justice Specialist (TEJS) oversees IAD's environmental, energy, climate, and natural and cultural resource work, including the Energy Transition Act, the 30 x 30 Initiative, the 50 Year Water Plan, and the Hydrogen Hub initiative, among many others. A primary goal is to ensure expanded outreach, engagement and collaboration with the NPTs and stakeholders, while protecting the interests of these groups in Legislatively-assigned Boards and Commissions, as well as other work groups that may impact all these peoples.

The TEJS attended over 70 meetings in FY25, acting to build and maintain relationships between an organization and its community, promoting awareness and engagement.

Public Safety

- **Veteran's Project**

Veterans hold a place of deep honor and respect in Native communities. To recognize their service and support their well-being, IAD focused its operating budget special projects funding on Native American Veterans. IAD allocated \$217,153 to Tribal Veterans Programs and special projects. Funded projects included activities such as participating in meetings, accessing behavioral health services, and organizing events that focused on the unique needs of Veterans.

- **Missing & Murdered Indigenous Persons (MMIP)**

On May 5, 2025, IAD co-hosted the annual MMIP Awareness Day at the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center in partnership with the Coalition to Stop Violence Against Native Women and other allies. The event brought together over 150 attendees, including Tribal leaders, families, advocates, and community members representing over 30 Tribal Nations. The day featured storytelling, a community Honor Walk, cultural performance by a Native youth group, and healing workshops.

IAD also unveiled its newly updated MMIP logo, created by Marcus Trujillo (Haatzee Designs, Pueblo of Laguna), symbolizing remembrance, advocacy, and resilience. This visual identity represents IAD's commitment to cultural responsiveness, visibility for impacted families, and continued collaboration with Tribal Nations.



Governance and Policy

- **Legislation & Policy**

The State of New Mexico began the 57th Legislative Session on January 21, 2025, for a 60-day session, concluding on March 22, 2025. IAD led efforts on two bills signed by Governor Lujan Grisham: the Tribal Regalia Bill and the Turquoise Alert.

Tribal Regalia at School Events (Senate Bill 163/House Bill 194)¹

The Tribal Regalia law permits Native American students who attend state public and charter schools to wear tribal regalia at graduation ceremonies and public school events. This was

signed into law with an emergency clause to take effect immediately and apply to students graduating in 2025. New Mexico joins 19 other states who have similar regalia legislation.

*Turquoise Alert System (Senate Bill 41)*²

The Turquoise Alert is a specialized emergency response to address the crisis of missing Native Americans across the state of New Mexico. This alert system requires the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to develop and implement a Turquoise Alert plan for the purpose of disseminating information about a person subject to the alert through media, law enforcement, cell service providers (in some cases) and state employees. For DPS to activate the alert, there are specific criteria that must be met for the missing person. New Mexico is the fifth state to implement an alert system for missing Native Americans.

IAD continues to assess legislative initiatives which may impact Native American people in New Mexico. IAD partners with state and tribal leaders on issues ranging from infrastructure and climate resilience to behavioral health and broadband access, ensuring that policies honor tribal sovereignty and reflect the needs of the community.

Both pieces of legislation made it through all committee hearing and the Senate and House Floors unanimously.

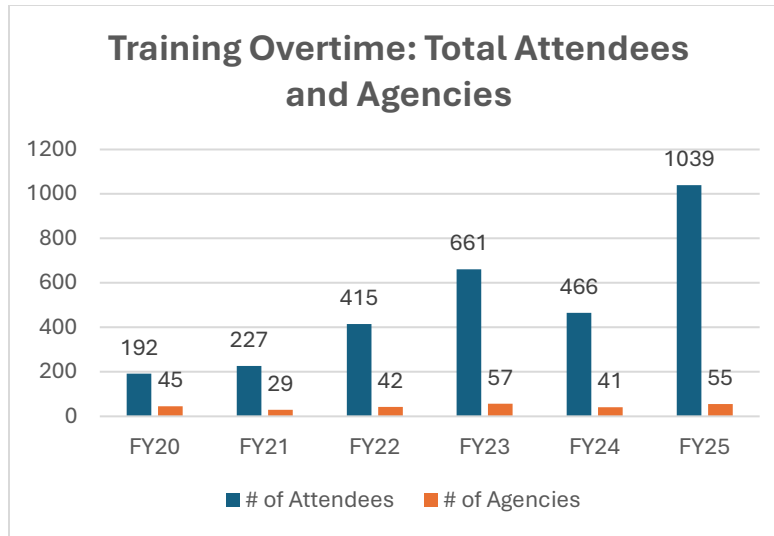
- **State-Tribal Collaboration and Consultation**

IAD coordinated quarterly with agency-designated tribal liaisons to offer technical assistance, support effective collaboration and consultation efforts, and clarify agency obligations under the STCA. Since most tribal liaisons serve in this role as an additional duty rather than a full-time position, providing consistent and reliable resources is essential to their success.

In late 2024, IAD, in partnership with the State Personnel Office, updated the Cultural Competency training, which is required for all state agency managers and employees who have ongoing communications with NPTs to complete (NMSA 1978, § 11-18-4(B)). The training integrates relevant historical and current state & federal law pertinent to working with NPTs, as well as the STCA. As of January 2025, the training is available to all state employees on demand.

- 100% of IAD staff completed the training in FY25
- 1,039 state staff across 55 agencies completed the training in FY25
- This is a 122.9% increase over FY024

Youth & Education

- Indigenous Youth Council**

During the 2024 Legislative Session, IAD received a Government Results and Opportunity (GRO) Funds for Fiscal Years 2025 and 2026 (L. 2024, Ch. 69, § 9(D)). A Notice of Funding Availability was made available to NPTs to support the creation or expansion of Youth Councils. It created impactful opportunities for Youth Council members to attend conferences, trainings, and cultural experiences that build leadership skills, strengthen community engagement, and deepen their understanding of governance. It spearheaded outreach and peer-led training efforts to promote Youth Council initiatives within NPTs. In FY25 \$167,000 was awarded to seven NPTs, with a second round of awards to two NPTs.

Additionally, IAD sponsored the Youth Wellness Summit, titled “Caring for our Relatives,” which took place from June 5 to June 7, 2025 in Albuquerque, New Mexico. 47 Native youth from across the state attended, representing eight NPTs. The Summit was funded by IAD and concentrated on the Youth Gathering of Native Americans initiative and focused on promoting wellness and preventing suicide and substance misuse among Native youth. The Summit aimed to engage youth in community wellness efforts,

empower them to become leaders of positive change, and support them in creating personal and community wellness plans. Throughout the three days, the Summit fostered connection, cultural affirmation, leadership development, and community-driven wellness planning. The Summit concluded with a commitment ceremony where youth reflected on their experiences and a closing lunch, ending with a participant questionnaire to capture feedback.

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- **Entrepreneur Training**

IAD allocated \$50,000 towards delivery of in-depth, culturally tailored entrepreneurial training to Native American-owned businesses across New Mexico. Over the course of three months, 12 Native-owned businesses were selected to participate in these trainings to improve their overall success.

Participants highlighted several sessions as particularly impactful, including *Bookkeeping and Tax Basics*, the *Solutions Hot Seat Panel*, and *Impactful Communication – The Four Agreements*. Other notable sessions included *Business Plan Basics*, the *Resources Panel*, and *Certifications, Licensing, and Insurance*. Survey feedback indicated excellent ratings, underscoring the program’s high-quality content and delivery.

As a result of the training, most participants reported feeling more confident in their next steps as entrepreneurs. Key takeaways included:

- A stronger understanding of business fundamentals, such as tax obligations and necessary certifications
- The ability to develop customized business plans
- Increased awareness of effective, mindful communication practices

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Other Funding

- **Recurring Funds (General Operating Budget)**

During the 2024 Legislative Session, IAD received recurring appropriations to support initiatives that strengthen Native American communities across New Mexico (L. 2024, Ch. 69, § 5). The Indian Pueblo Cultural Center received \$120,000 to advance language preservation efforts and an additional \$110,000 to promote Indigenous wisdom. Santa Fe Indian School received \$50,000 to support leadership and educational initiatives. The Pueblo of Jemez received \$197,000 for self-help home construction and an additional \$100,000 through the Special Projects Fund to support locally identified priorities. IAD ensures funds are encumbered and expended timely and in alignment with legislative intent.

- **Government Results & Opportunity (GRO) Special Appropriations**

During the 2024 Legislative Session and effective FY25, the Legislature allocated eight GRO appropriations to IAD for a total of \$1,560,000. The GRO funds include a range of efforts benefiting Native American communities across the state through FY26 (L. 2024, Ch. 69, § 9). IAD awarded \$1,270,000 in FY25, with the remaining balance to be distributed through FY26.

Capital Outlay/TIF

The Capital Outlay/Tribal Infrastructure Fund (CO/TIF) Team consists of four CO/TIF Administrators and one CO/TIF Manager. Each administrator is assigned to and manages over 100 various projects at a time.

During the 2024 Legislative Session and effective FY25, NPTs were awarded 117 new Capital Outlay projects for a total amount of \$88,133,000.00, and 24 projects were reauthorized. TIF awarded 17 infrastructure projects totaling \$63,310,000.00 in FY25, reference appendix A for details.

Future Goals/Objectives Related to NPTs

For FY26, IAD's goals are:

- Continue to serve as a resource and provide resources for NPTs, Native American citizens and state agencies to ensure communication, collaboration and awareness between all parties.
- Internal organization through standard operating procedures and ensuring consistency throughout the Agency.

- Ensuring that funding is not only encumbered or obligated, but that we are working with Grantees to ensure that funding is expended. IAD will serve as technical assistance, if needed.
- IAD will continue to be more visible in the community through various outreach and communication methods. IAD will attend community ribbon cuttings and/or events as they relate to state funded projects.
- IAD is committed to working with other Agencies to help bring awareness to suicides and suicide prevention for Native Americans in New Mexico.

While IAD does not generally have the capacity, or sometimes the expertise in an area, to provide direct services, IAD serves as a liaison and assists our constituents with access and awareness. IAD is focused on establishing relationships with NPTs, Native American citizens and state agencies to connect and cultivate relationships.

Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) will ensure clear staff roles and responsibilities, many of which are still new. This consistency and clear guidance will ensure that IAD has capacity and clear objectives for each position. These efforts are to assist IAD in maintaining a stable agency that can continue to work on meetings its vision and efforts.

IAD will provide funding opportunities for the following projects in FY26:

- Fund a qualified provider to deliver services that promote and expand behavioral health and suicide prevention services by integrating traditional practices, cultural awareness, and community-driven approaches into mental health wellness and suicide prevention initiatives through utilizing cultural activities and language as the identified sources of support.
- Fund NPTs to support activities and/or projects that promote the holistic health and development of Native youth by providing culturally relevant education on puberty, hygiene, and wellness for both adolescent males and females. This grant aims to foster self-awareness, reduce stigma around male development and menstruation, and improve overall health literacy. Projects should support positive identity development, ensure access to essential hygiene and menstrual products, and deliver culturally relevant education to equip Native youth with the knowledge, tools, and dignity they need to thrive.
- Fund NPTs and a qualified provider to address tobacco cessation and prevention initiatives that benefit Native Americans communities and citizens in New Mexico
- Fund NPTs to support activities and/or projects of Youth Councils, including the creation or expansion of Youth Councils; opportunities for Youth Council members to participate in cultural activities that can increase their skills, influence their communities and learn about governance.

To further advance behavioral health efforts, IAD will provide targeted resources for suicide prevention and program enhancement aimed at improving the overall behavioral health for Native Americans in New Mexico.

IAD will continue to serve on the Behavioral Health Planning Council (BHPC)(NMSA 1978, § 24A-3-2). IAD will guide the Native American Subcommittee (NASC) in identifying priorities

and providing critical support to the BHPC in addressing the behavioral health needs of New Mexico's Native populations (NMSA 1978, § 24A-3-2(C)(6)(e)).

As part of its ongoing efforts, IAD will sponsor the following events:

- A statewide Suicide Prevention Summit;
- A state summit focused on tribal behavioral health providers and services;
- An annual Youth Summit on Mental Health.

IAD supports a more dynamic curriculum designed to support more state staff with varying interactions with Native American citizens, including:

- Onboarding for tribal liaisons across all agencies once they have designated or hired for the role, this will be a virtual training with IAD staff
- Native American Cultural Competency for state staff with frequent interactions with NPT leadership and administrations, as well as all tribal liaisons
- Enhanced STCA training to provide more technical assistance and best practices for the collaboration and consultation process for state staff with frequent interactions with NPT leadership and administrations, as well as all tribal liaisons

In early 2021, IAD launched its inaugural IYC, which culminated in a formal report and a set of recommendations delivered to Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham. The IYC plays a vital role in ensuring that the voices, perspectives, and concerns of Indigenous youth are not only heard but actively shape the policies and decisions that impact their lives. Recognizing the importance of this leadership platform, IAD plans to recruit a new cohort of Native youth to continue and expand on the efforts and recommendations of the first council, building momentum for lasting change driven by youth leadership.

IAD will provide funding opportunities for the following projects in FY26:

- Fund a qualified provider to deliver culturally relevant and community-informed financial literacy education tailored to Native American individuals and communities. This initiative aims to address persistent economic challenges—including financial exclusion, limited access to banking, digital divides, and vulnerability to predatory lending—by equipping Native youth and adults with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to achieve financial security and independence.
- Fund a qualified provider to deliver entrepreneurial training, education, and resources to assist tribal members in New Mexico in starting, expanding, and sustaining Native-owned businesses. Entrepreneurial training to Native American business owners aimed to build business acumen, financial literacy, and access to resources. This effort will promote self-sufficiency, strengthen tribal economies, and support the preservation and revitalization of cultural and traditional values through entrepreneurship.

Capital Outlay/TIF

During the 2025 Legislative Session and effective for FY26, NPTs were awarded 122 new Capital Outlay projects for a total amount of \$63,307,059.00, and 44 projects were reauthorized. (L. 2025, Ch. 159, § 31; L. 2025, Ch. 158). TIF awarded 28 projects totaling \$80,574,147.00 in

FY26. The CO/TIF Team will continue providing project management assistance for all new and reauthorized Capital Outlay projects as well as TIF projects. Capital Outlay and TIF projects are provided multi-year funding.
